

Prince to King Mentor Program History

The Prince to King Mentor Program was developed out of the admiration and love a mother has for her son. As Bobbie T. Jordan admired the growth and accomplishments of her young prince and thanked the King of Kings for such a blessing, she worried about what challenges life would bring him and what tools he would need to live a healthy, happy, spiritually strong and successful life. As she pondered this circumstance, she started to write notes of things she could expose him to in order to enrich his life, entice positive decision making, be educational and fun, and motivate him to be independent and to flourish. Upon review of her notes, she knew the list would never be complete, so she vowed – "Every morning when I wake, I shall first thank God for a new day, and every day I shall think of things I must do to help prepare my son to become the king growing inside of him."


On this journey Bobbie T. Jordan realized that her son was not the only prince in the land that required mentoring and guidance. The members of Rho Chi Omega Chapter listened intently as the proposal was presented and accepted the challenge to develop the "Prince to King Mentor Program." In September of 2009, the trumpet was sounded, and the members of Rho Chi Omega Chapter went out into the land to rally each prince, and a new tradition was instituted.

The program is designed to motivate, educate, and encourage positive growth in young men in grades 3 through 8 by exposing them to positive community/world leaders, cultural, entertaining and educational activities through enrichment workshops. The participants are distinguished by three royal groups: Noblemen (Grades 3-4), Aristocrats (Grades 5-6), and Knights (Grades 7-8).

The program has a standing theme and motto, respectively: "The King in Me" and "Every morning when I wake, I shall first thank God for a new day. Every day I shall think: Today I must do something to prepare myself to be **KING**."

The experiences, lessons, friendship, self-esteem, and chivalry acquired by participating in this program are part of the tool set that the sorority seeks to help develop in each participant and will hopefully carry through in some phase of their development.

Prince to King Mentor Program Coat of Arms



The coat of arms has been prepared as a reminder of the skill set of a kingly man. Participants are to refer to it as a compass for their sense of purpose, a symbol of a brotherhood shared with other royal men.

The coat of arms is topped with a Crown to signify their place in society.

The Shield/Breast Plate shall protect them from all hurt, harm and danger.

The Wings shall give them flight and carry them to places beyond your wildest dreams.

The Legs allow them to stand and remain balanced during their toughest challenges.

The breast plate bears four symbols:

- ♦ Book and Lamp of Knowledge EDUCATION and KNOWLEDGE are important
- ◆ Clasped Hands and Globe Signifying COMMUNITY and SERVICE
- ◆ Man of Justice and Scale of Law Signifying LEADERSHIP and EQUALITY
- Mounted Knight Signifying CHIVALRY (proper etiquette and manners)

The coat of arms will remind each participant to be just in their dealings, to protect their future and that of their fellow man.

The coat of arms was developed in a collaborative effort between Bobbie T. Jordan, Susan L. Eason, and Cheryl K. Johnson. All graphic design elements were created by Susan L. Eason.

Prince to King (P2K) Mentor Program **Program Overview**

THEME "The King in Me"

MOTTO

"Every morning when I wake, I shall first thank God for a new day. Every day I shall think: Today I must do something to prepare myself to be KING."

VISION

The Prince to King Mentor Program is designed to motivate, educate, and entice positive growth in young men in grades 3 through 8 by exposing them to positive community/world leaders, cultural, entertaining and educational activities through enrichment workshops. The curriculum will be created by Rho Chi Omega Chapter and the presenters will be males from the community.

PRINCE

A royal or noble man or boy; a man or boy who is ranked highly in his field; a man who is outstanding, especially because of his generous or chivalrous nature.

KING

The principal man or preeminent male figure in a field; somebody who possesses exceptional power or influence in an area of activity.

PROGRAM COLORS

Purple (imperial, royal, or other high rank)- Purple is the color of good judgment. It is the color of people seeking spiritual fulfillment. It is said if you surround yourself with purple, you will have peace of mind. Purple is a good color to use in meditation.

Purple has been used to symbolize magic and mystery, as well as royalty. Being the combination of red and blue, the warmest and coolest colors, purple is believed to be the ideal color. Most children love the color purple.

Green is the color of nature. It symbolizes growth, harmony, freshness, and fertility. Green has strong emotional correspondence with safety. Dark green is also commonly associated with money.

Green has great healing power. It is the most restful color for the human eye. Green suggests stability and endurance. In heraldry, green indicates growth and hope. Green means safety; it is the color of free passage.

Workshop Attire

- Slacks/Khaki (no jeans or shorts)
- P2K Shirt or Collared Shirt (no T-shirts)
- Casual/Dress Shoes (no sneakers/tennis shoes)
- No attire (overcoats, jackets, etc.) shall not display wording or represent anything violent, such as guns, knives, skulls, gang symbols, etc.

Closing Ceremony Attire for the Participants

- ♦ Black Suit
- ♦ White Shirt
- ♦ Bow Tie or Necktie
- ♦ Black Socks
- Black Shoes

The closing ceremony is formal. The attire listed above is required for the participants in the closing ceremony. Each participant is responsible for the purchase of the required attire except the bow tie or necktie. Rho Chi Omega Chapter will provide the neckwear for each participant.

Program Fees

The registration fee is \$150.00 per participant. The registration fee covers program activities, team building activity, program shirt, and closing ceremony fee for program participants. Registration fees can be paid electronically at https://www.aka-rco.org/prince2king or by cash or check made payable to Rho Chi Omega at onsite registration.

Registration fees are non-refundable. All returned checks will incur a returned check processing

fee.

The closing ceremony is \$60.00 per person. Participants will be required to sell a minimum of two (2) tickets each. **The ceremony tickets are non-refundable.**

Refund Policy

All fees paid to Rho Chi Omega Chapter are not refundable in full or in part under any circumstances. This includes, but is not limited to registration fees, advertising fees, and ceremony ticket fees. Should a participant withdraw from the Prince to King Mentor Program, for any reason, he will not receive a refund of any fees.

Release of Liability

To participate in the Prince to King Mentor Program, the Release of Liability form must be signed by the parent/guardian of each participant. The committee chairman will keep the form on file.

Prince to King Participant Code of Conduct

Purpose of the Code of Conduct

The Prince to King Code of Conduct establishes standards of conduct and identify the circumstances under which a participant may be removed or excluded from an activity or removed from the Prince to King program.

The Code provides information to parents and participants regarding expectations for behavior, consequences of misconduct, and procedures for administering discipline.

Each participant and parent/guardian must sign the Participant Code of Conduct to be able to participate in the Prince to King Mentor Program.

Standards of Participant Conduct

The Prince to King program is committed to the rights of participants. In addition, the program has detailed certain expectations (responsibilities) regarding participant behavior that, when adopted by participants, affect a positive influence on the program and program participants. A proper balance between rights and responsibilities is essential if the program provides the kinds of educational experiences that promote self-responsibility and enhance educational opportunities for all participants.

Five standards of participant conduct are offered as a guideline. These standards assert that responsible participants should be encouraged and taught to:

- 1. Exercise self-control.
 - a. Use courteous language.
 - b. Resolve conflict in a mature manner.
 - c. Be appropriately dressed and groomed.
 - d. Demonstrate a positive attitude.
- 2. Take a leadership role.
 - a. Be polite.
 - b. Be cooperative.
- 3. Respect the rights and feelings of others.
 - a. Behave in a manner that does not disrupt others.
 - b. Treat others with courtesy and respect (i.e., put oneself in the place of the other person, whether that person is another participant, teacher, presenter, community person, committee members, or any other person on site.)

- 4. Take responsibility for program property.
 - a. Respect the building, grounds, and property.
 - b. Keep the site free from trash.
- 5. Support the learning process.
 - a. Attend and participate in all workshops and activities regularly and on time.
 - b. Be prepared for workshops (i.e., bring assignments, notebooks, and supplies).
 - c. Listen carefully to instructions.
 - d. Participate in program activities.

The Program plan is to promote positive participant conduct in conjunction with the site/workshop rules to maintain order in the program, foster a climate of mutual respect for the rights of others, and teach participants that they are responsible for conducting themselves in a manner appropriate to their age and level of maturity.

Expectations for Participant Behavior

Each participant is expected to:

- 1. Demonstrate courtesy and respect for others, even when others do not.
- 2. Behave in a responsible manner, always exercising self-discipline.
- 3. Attend all workshops/activities, regularly and on time.
- 4. Be prepared for each workshop; take appropriate materials and assignments to workshops.
- 5. Be well-groomed and dressed appropriately.
- 6. Obey all site and program rules.
- 7. Respect the rights and privileges of other participants and of presenters and other program committee members.
- 8. Respect the property of others, including program property and facilities.
- 9. Cooperate with or assist the program staff in maintaining safety, order, and discipline.
- 10. Participants must be signed in and out by an adult.

Prohibited Conduct and Disciplinary Consequences

In imposing discipline, the Program Chairman or Co-Chairman will consider:

- 1. The seriousness of the offense.
- 2. The participant's age.
- 3. The participant's attitude.
- 4. The potential effect of the misconduct on the program environment.
- 5. Whether the participant was defending himself.
- 6. Intent or lack of intent at the time of the conduct.
- 7. Participants will be removed from the program with repeated misconduct.
- 8. Parents/guardians will be required to immediately pick up participant if called for misconduct.
- 9. Participants expelled from the program for repeated misconduct or major violation of the code of conduct will not receive a refund.

Personal Enrichment Workshops

Participants are required to attend and actively participate in **all** program activities. The workshops will expose participants to activities that will focus on self-esteem, manners, etiquette, social skills, bullying, social media, team building, oratorical skills and being a Black male in the world today. Workshops and activities are listed in the Calendar of Events section of the handbook.

In addition to attending the workshops, each participant is required to keep a "Workshop Notebook" of his "Prince to King" experience. The sorority will provide the notebook. The participant introduces himself with a favorite photograph. Any information received from the workshops will be put in the notebook. Each participant is encouraged to take notes during the workshops.

Participants will not be allowed to chew gum or eat candy. Participants can bring a cellular phone device, but will not be able to use it during the workshops, unless it is an emergency. Light refreshments will be served after each workshop. ALLERGY NOTIFICATION: If your participant has food allergies, please notify the program chair immediately. Notifications must be in writing. Also inform your participant not to partake in snacks if he has known allergies.

Community Service Project

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated® is dedicated to implementing programs of service that enhance the social, economic, and educational well-being of the local, national, and international communities. Programs remain the heart of AKA. The size and scope of services provided to our communities have grown and significantly improve the quality of life for all who reside within our service areas.

The International Program theme for 2022-2026 is Soaring to Greater Heights of Service and Sisterhood. The International Program includes program initiatives that are designed to advance the mission of Alpha Kappa Alpha with excellence and underscore our commitment to sustainable service.

The P2K participants will have the opportunity to plan and implement a service project(s) with focus on the International program initiative "Uplift Our Local Community". We will uplift our local community and celebrate our local community by bringing about impactful change on a local level by executing projects that have a rich legacy of innovative, need-based programs that have significantly impacted the health and welfare of women, men, and children worldwide.

Oratorical Competition

The purpose of the Oratorical Competition is to develop, encourage, and reinforce verbal communication skills, develop self-esteem, confidence, and build character. This event allows the participants to express themselves through speech. The subject will be age appropriate and shall not be provocative, insulting to one particular group, or include profanity. The prepared

oration must be the original effort of each participant. Participants may have in their possession a copy of their prepared oration on index cards. They may consult the copy of their prepared oration during the presentation. A typed copy of the prepared presentation must be provided to the committee chairman or co-chairman on the day of presentation. All participants at each program level are required to participate. All presentations must be spoken in the English language.

All participants will speak on the official topic: "The Power of Voice: Speaking Truth, Sparking Change". Participants must express and celebrate the transformative power of Black male voices throughout history, while empowering the next generation to rise with purpose. Participants may also explore their own potential as storytellers, truth-tellers, and changemakers. They are allowed to make the subject as broad or individualized as they would like. Each participant's presentation must be a minimum of 3 minutes and a maximum of 5 minutes.

The competition will be judged on the following criteria with 10 possible points for each item:

- 1) Eye Contact maintained proper eye contact with audience and used proper gestures to emphasize points
- 2) Voice and Articulation used correct pronunciation and enunciation of words and had good voice tone
- 3) Language language used in presentation was grammatically proper and sentence structure clear
- 4) Faithfulness to Theme focused on the prescribed theme throughout presentation, 5) Content presentation focused on the theme
- 6) Organization of Material presentation was well organized and showed a clear theme
- 7) Introduction and Conclusion had an introduction and conclusion that kept to the central theme
- 8) Enthusiasm showed enthusiasm for presentation and deep conviction in material presentation
- 9) Interest Maintained created and maintained audience interest
- 10) Memorization participant spoke from memory, may use notes, but did not rely on notes.

Timing will begin immediately after the official topic is expressed. Any salutation to judges, audience, etc. should precede the announcement of the topic. Timing will stop when the participant finishes. The participant will be penalized 3 points for going over or under the stated time limit.

The oratorical competition will be conducted in person. Costumes and hand props are permitted. Stage props are not permitted. No audio-visual or CD accompaniment is permitted.

The panel of judges, statistician, and timekeeper for this event will be from the community. A member of Rho Chi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated[®] will not be a judge, statistician, or timekeeper for this event. The results of the judges' decision will be kept

in a sealed envelope and opened on the evening of the closing ceremony.

Each participant will receive a certificate of participation for participating in the oratorical competition. The Best Speaker (Mr. Communicator) award for each category will be announced the evening of the ceremony and receive a trophy. The Oratorical Competition is open to the public. Family and friends are invited to attend and support their participant. Admission is free.

Souvenir Booklet

A souvenir booklet will be available at the closing ceremony. All participants will be photographed and featured in the program booklet. If family members and/or friends wish to purchase an ad in the program booklet to congratulate a special participant, the following ad sizes are available:

Photographs

The chapter has arranged for a photographer to take photos for the souvenir journal. The photos for the program are compliments of the chapter. Participants are required to wear an uninterrupted black suit, white button-down dress shirt with collar, black socks, and black shoes for pictures. Rho Chi Omega will provide a black bow tie to be used for the photo. Pictures are scheduled for Sunday, September 14, 2025.

Awards and Certificates

Participants will be eligible for the following awards. All awards will be presented at the closing ceremony.

<u>Participation Awards</u>: Each participant will receive a participation award and a crown at the closing banquet.

<u>Peer vote awards:</u> Peers will receive a ballot to vote for participants in their category. The participant with the majority vote will receive the award. A winner from each category will be designated. Each winner will receive a trophy. Criteria for each award is listed below.

FUTURE LEADER (The Boss)

Criteria:

- Diplomatically takes charge and leads members.
- Takes responsibility for his actions and motivates others.
- Exhibits good communication skills.
- Exemplifies strategies to becoming a dynamic leader in school or the community.
- Unlocks his potential and motivated to put their skills into action.

TEAM BUILDER (Mr. Inclusion)

Criteria:

- Encourages participation from fellow members.
- Assists the team members in becoming a cohesive unit.
- Fosters an environment of collaboration.
- Demonstrates flexibility.
- Supports the team and decisions.
- Helpful and supportive of others.

Chapter vote award: The Mr. Congeniality award will be presented to the "one" participant with prominent leadership and social skills. Participants will be evaluated on the following: *KING (Mr. Congeniality)*

Criteria:

- Must attend ALL workshops
- Leadership
 - 1. Mentor to peers
 - 2. Team Player
 - 3. Self-motivated
 - 4. Diplomatically takes charge and leads team members
 - 5. Respected among peers
- Personality/Manners
 - 6. Character
 - 7. Behavior
 - 8. Selfless service
 - 9. Takes responsibility for his actions
- Actively participates in workshops

The winner will receive a trophy.
