





O.W. Gurley
Founder
of
Black Wall Street

Born: 1868

Died: 1935

- Around the start of the 20th century, O. W. Gurley, a wealthy black landowner born in Huntsville, Alabama came to what was then known as Indian Territory to participate in the Oklahoma Land run of 1889. The young entrepreneur had just resigned from a presidential appointment under president Grover Cleveland in order to strike out on his own."
- In 1906, Gurley moved to Tulsa, Oklahoma, where he purchased 40 acres of land which was "only to be sold to colored."
- Among Gurley's first businesses was a rooming house which was located on a dusty trail near the railroad tracks. This road was given the name Greenwood Avenue, named for a city in Mississippi. The area became very popular among black migrants fleeing the oppression in Mississippi. They would find refuge in Gurley's building, as the racial persecution from the south was non-existent on Greenwood Avenue.
- In addition to his rooming house, Gurley built three two-story buildings and five residences and bought an 80-acre farm in Rogers County. Gurley also founded what is today Vernon AME Church. He also helped build a black Masonic lodge and an employment agency.

- Born on 12-25-1868. He was born in Huntsville, Al. He is accomplished in the area of Business.
- Once proclaimed the wealthiest man in Tulsa, Oklahoma, O.W. Gurley saw his property and his wealth disappear on May 31st - June 1, 1921 in the flames of the Tulsa Race Riot. While the majority of the nearly 300 people believed killed were Black and the millions of dollars lost in the destruction of businesses and property were suffered by Black Tulsans, Blacks were blamed for starting the riot. Even Gurley would testify before the Grand Jury investigating the riot that a group of Black men were responsible for the destruction. On June 4th, Gurley was quoted as saying "...belligerent Negroes established headquarters at the plant of a Negro newspaper." That newspaper was more than likely the Tulsa Star, published by Andrew J. Smitherman.
- Gurley said "on the night of the riots he went to the newspaper office about nine o'clock and found activities far advanced." Men were coming in singly and in little groups." he said. "In answer to the call to arms, and guns and ammunition were being collected from every available source. Many of the men." he continued were making open threats and talking in a most turbulent manner. ., When I saw what was going on I tried to talk them out of the Idea of arming themselves to prevent what they believed was a threatened lynching, but they were in such a dangerous mood that I almost got in trouble myself. There were not more than forty or fifty men in the crowd of armed Negroes who marched upon the court house. They were nearly all dope users or jake drinkers with police records. However, ' there were a few more intelligent ones fax the lead." 'Gurley named several negroes as leaders."
- Gurley was born on December 25, 1868 in Huntsville, Alabama. In 1876, his parents, John and Rosanna moved the family to Pine Bluff, Alabama. Gurley had three siblings, John, 1870-1941, Millie, 1872 and Robert, 1874. Gurley was a graduate of the Branch Normal School of Jeff County, Arkansas. He married the former Emma Evans on January 25, 1888 in Jeff, Arkansas. She was born in 1870.
- Gurley was not a native Oklahoman but moved to the Oklahoma, Territory at a time when Blacks in the thousands moved to the area they saw a mecca for the establishment of Black towns. He was a participant in the Oklahoma land rush of 1889. According to other biographers, he resigned a presidential appointment by the administration of President Grover Cleveland to seek his future out west.
- Gurley began the work of community building almost immediately upon his arrival in the territory. In 1889 he served as the principal of the City Schools of Perry, Oklahoma. In 1906 he helped to found the AME Church in Tulsa. The same year he purchased 40 acres of land that he reserved for Black purchases only. This land established Tulsa's Black community. Gurley built a hotel, built five homes and three two-story buildings, had a real estate business, and was also a merchant. In addition, he purchased an 80 acre farm in Rogers County. Gurley's hotel was located on a road he named Greenwood, after the city of Greenwood, Mississippi.
- This community that was destroyed in 1921 has been called "Black Wall Street" because of the prosperity of Blacks in Tulsa and their creation of businesses, professional practices and real estate holdings that made men like Gurley wealthy. Gurley was said to have lost over \$200,000 in the riot. He never recovered and left Oklahoma. He moved to Los Angeles, California and can be found in the voter registration rolls in 1928. He is also listed in the 1930 City Directory as living at 364 East 33rd Street. The exact date of his death is unknown. ~Uncrowned Community Builders~

- Entrepreneurs also began to emerge. John Williams and his wife, Loula, built a confectionary store and erected the opulent Dreamland Theater. Simon Berry built a private transportation network of Model T. Fords and buses, which transported residents through Greenwood and all the way to downtown Tulsa. Berry soon began chartering planes for Tulsa's increasingly wealthy oilmen.
- Though the population was relatively small, Greenwood also had two newspapers, including the Tulsa Star, founded by A.J. Smitherman. Others built pool halls, auto repair shops, beauty parlors, grocers, barber shops, and funeral homes. There was a Y.M.C.A and a roller skating rink, a hospital, and a U.S. post office substation. With all this activity, Greenwood's economy was gushing like one of Getty's wells. It was calculated that every dollar spent in Greenwood circulated the Black economy nearly thirty times as business thrived.





Stradford

- Another black American entrepreneur, J.B. Stradford and his wife Bertie Eleanor Wiley Stradford, arrived in Tulsa in 1899. He believed that black people had a better chance of economic progress if they pooled their resources, worked together and supported each other's businesses. He bought large tracts of real estate in the northeastern part of Tulsa, which he had subdivided and sold exclusively to other blacks. Stradford later built the Stradford Hotel on Greenwood, where blacks could enjoy the amenities of the downtown hotels who served only whites. It was said to be the largest black-owned hotel in the United States.



- The luxury 55-room hotel in Greenwood, Tulsa, was a symbol of the city's success. It was the largest black-owned hotel in the US and one of several businesses that belonged to JB Stradford, a former slave who moved to Tulsa in the late 19th century.
- The Ku Klux Klan was on the march across Oklahoma and other southern states, and the Jim Crow laws that enforced segregation in most of the South convinced leaders like Stradford that black people would need to build their own communities if they were to succeed.

Actual “Jim Crow” Laws:

- **Mississippi:** Separate free schools shall be established...unlawful for any colored child to attend any white school, or any white child to attend a colored school.
- **Alabama:** ...unlawful for a negro and white person to play together or in company with each other at any game of pool or billiards.
- **Georgia:** [Restaurants] shall serve either white people exclusively or colored people exclusively and shall not sell to the two races within the same room...
- **Georgia:** ...unlawful for any amateur white baseball team to play...within two blocks of a playground devoted to the Negro race, ...unlawful for any amateur colored baseball team to play baseball within two blocks of any playground devoted to the white race.

- May 31 – June 1, 1921
- On the morning of May 30, 1921, a young black man named Dick Rowland was riding in the elevator in the Drexel Building at Third and Main with a white woman named Sarah Page. The details of what followed vary from person to person. Accounts of an incident circulated among the city's white community during the day and became more exaggerated with each telling.
- Tulsa police arrested Rowland the following day and began an investigation. An inflammatory report in the May 31 edition of the Tulsa Tribune spurred a confrontation between black and white armed mobs around the courthouse where the sheriff and his men had barricaded the top floor to protect Rowland. Shots were fired and the outnumbered African Americans began retreating to the Greenwood District.
- In the early morning hours of June 1, 1921, Greenwood was looted and burned by white rioters. Governor Robertson declared martial law, and National Guard troops arrived in Tulsa. Guardsmen assisted firemen in putting out fires, took African Americans out of the hands of vigilantes and imprisoned all black Tulsans not already interned. Over 6,000 people were held at the Convention Hall and the Fairgrounds, some for as long as eight days.
- Twenty-four hours after the violence erupted, it ceased. In the wake of the violence, 35 city blocks lay in charred ruins, more than 800 people were treated for injuries and contemporary reports of deaths began at 36. Historians now believe as many as 300 people may have died.
- In order to understand the Tulsa Race Massacre it is important to understand the complexities of the times. Dick Rowland, Sarah Page and an unknown gunman were the sparks that ignited a long smoldering fire. Jim Crow, jealousy, white supremacy, and land lust, all played roles in leading up to the destruction and loss of life on May 31 and June 1, 1921.



IF YOUR FAMILY LIVES IN ANY OF THE FOLLOWING SITUATIONS:

In a shelter



In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation



In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station



Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship

Your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference.
 - * If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.

If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age children.

MALE BREAST CANCER

How aware are you?

We spoke with students at UOW on the topic of MALE BREAST CANCER. This is what we discovered:

65% of men DO NOT know about male breast cancer

BUT that **35%** who know, do not check, or know HOW to check.

We also discovered:

60% of men DON'T think it is something to worry about.

So what should I do?

- Look after yourself and help prevent **BREAST CANCER** in men!
- Self check; feel for lumps.
- Maintain a healthy diet.
- Lower alcohol intake.
- Avoid smoking.

All information gathered is from surveys conducted on campus at the University of Wollongong. Statistics shown are purely reflective of men surveyed throughout the UOW campus, aging from 18 - 50.

Breast Cancer Awareness

Breast Cancer is a disease in which cancer cells form in the tissues of the breast. Cancer grows when a cell's DNA is damaged. Breast Cancer is the most common cancer in women worldwide. Every 2 minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer in the United States.

The process used to find out whether the cancer has spread within the breast or other parts of the body is called staging. There are 4 stages of Breast Cancer. The earlier Breast Cancer is found the better the chance of treatment and winning the fight. Screening should be done by self-breast exams, mammograms (X-ray of breast) and MRI's.

There are certain risk factors associated with Breast Cancer such as genetic, environmental and lifestyle factors. Genetic factors include age, race, family history, and genetic factors. Environmental and lifestyle factors include inactivity, poor diet, alcohol consumption, overweight or obesity and personal menstrual history.

There are five treatment options or a combination of the following: Surgery, Radiation Therapy, Chemotherapy, Hormonal Therapy, and Targeted Drug Therapy.

Men get Breast Cancer too! Like women, men have breast tissue where cancer can develop. Male breast cancer is similar to female breast cancer and it develops in the same way in men as in women. About 1 in 1000 men will develop breast cancer. Men are diagnosed with breast cancer at more advanced stages than women. Risk factors, staging and treatment are the same as in women.

Death rates from Breast Cancer are declining due to better screening, early detection, increased awareness, and improved treatments.




